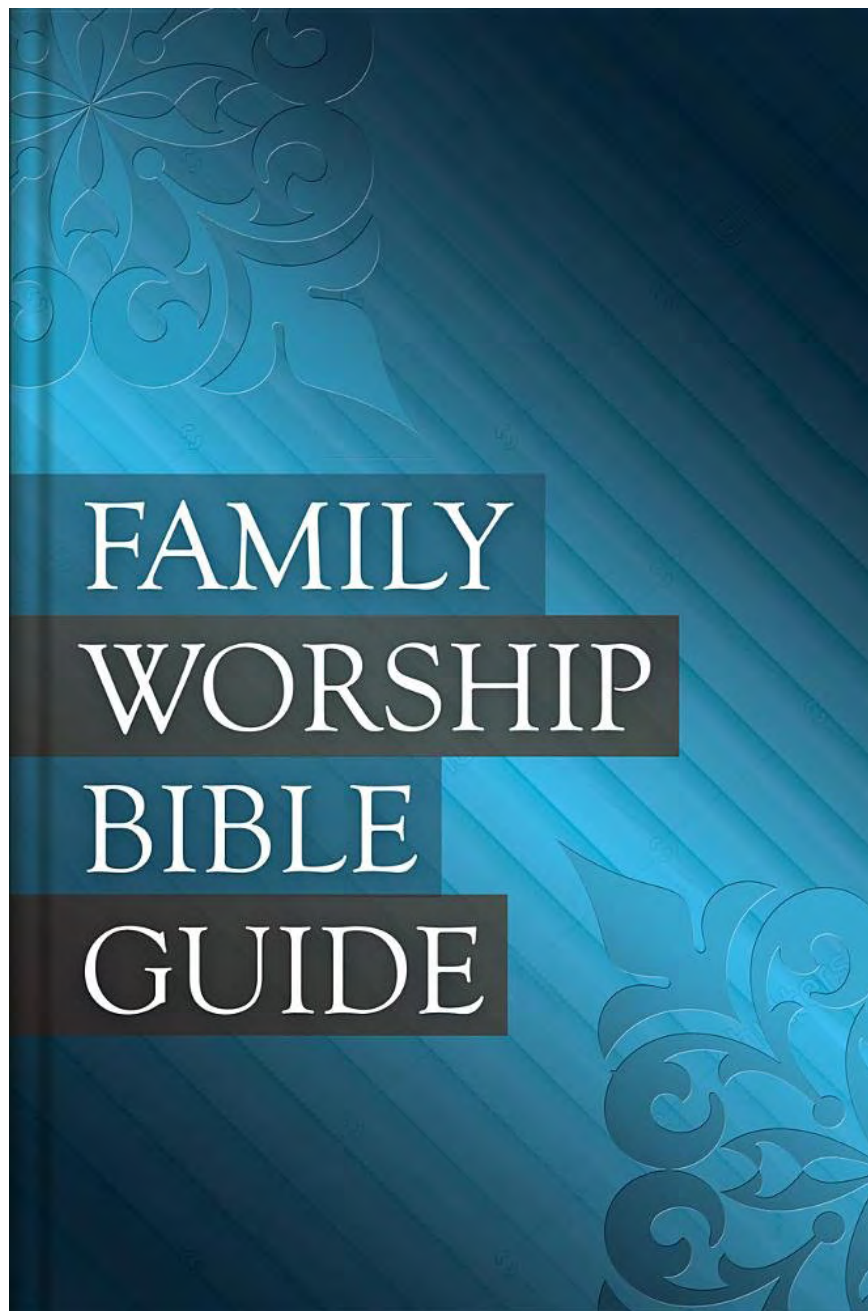

Your counsel to instruct,

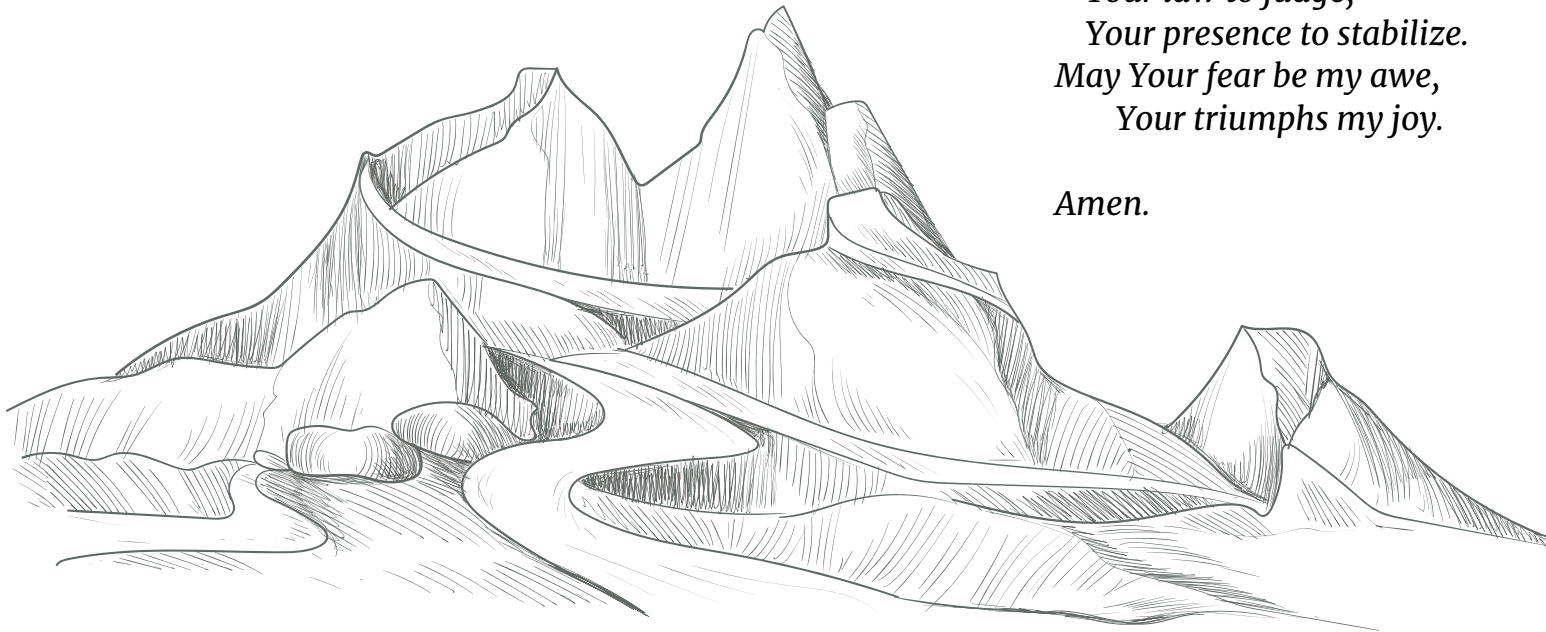
Your law to judge,

"ALL HAIL!":

1st Samuel, 1st King-Maker

The age of the Judges has left Israel in a terrible state. The people of Israel rejected God, deciding to do what was right in their own eyes. They called for a human king, so that Israel might be just like the surrounding nations – but it is also God's purpose to grant them a king. *Thus begins the age of Kings...*

? What is a 'Samuel'?

Samuel is a prophet (*a person chosen to speak for God to guide His people*). He is the son of Elkanah and Hannah. Hannah had been barren – and out of her intense longing for a son – she cries out to God and He gives her Samuel. As Hannah had promised God, she gives Samuel to the service of the LORD in the temple. There Samuel serves under the priest Eli, and receives his call as a prophet of God. Samuel served as the last judge of Israel. His most important duty was anointing the first two kings of Israel: Saul and David.

🕒 Seeing God in 1st Samuel

1st Samuel is a book of personalities. We learn about Eli, Samuel, Saul and David – but we also learn about God! What do we learn about God in 1st Samuel?

👑 **He is the King:** He will reign forever and ever. He is the One who anoints human kings, raising them up and even bringing them down. Human kings are answerable to the LORD for their actions, and are bound by His commands.

👉 **He is the Provider:** His timing is always perfect. He works all things for good. Where would Samuel be, if not for Hannah's difficult relationship with a rival wife? Where would David be if he had not brought bread to his brothers while they were facing Goliath? God often uses the routine, daily, and ordinary, to accomplish His purposes.

👂 **He is the All-Wise:** He has all knowledge. He has no regrets (1 Sam 15:29). He is always just and right. Therefore, His word & instruction is of utmost importance to our lives! Samuel listens. David though he sins terribly, listens and repents. Saul however, refuses to listen and perishes. God's wise word grants grace to sinners.

Mark the Momentum


This gospel account was written by John Mark – but it was actually based on the eye-witness report of the apostle Peter.


Read on to find out more...


Monumental Mark


What makes Mark's gospel so unique? Here are some ways!

 **Jesus, the Son of God:** Mark's gospel proclaims Jesus as the One with all authority to teach, heal and cast out demons. *Worship Him!*

 **Jesus, the Son of Man:** Mark's gospel also proclaims Jesus as the true representation of humanity, through His rejection and suffering. *Come to Him!*

 **Blitz:** Mark's gospel moves at an intense pace (*the word 'immediately' appears some 35 times!*) This book is lively, down-to-earth, and dramatic. It is also the shortest of the 4 gospel accounts. *Follow Him!*

 **Secrecy:** One of the unique traits of Mark's gospel is how Jesus seeks to keep His identity a secret by commanding silence from demons, those He heals, and even His disciples. *Pursue Him!*

 **Audiobook:** Mark's gospel is designed to be listened to! Its fast-paced, action-packed, dialogue-filled narrative is better heard than read. *Listen to Him!*

Nevertheless, Mark does not proclaim a 'new' gospel – he merely lends a unique perspective on it!

Mildly Mapped

The structure of Mark's gospel can be simply reduced to 3 junctions:

// Demonstration of Jesus' Authority (1:16-8:26)


/// Testing Jesus' Authority in Suffering (8:27-16:8)




Measure the Man


This book is all about Jesus! Here are some questions worth asking:


 Who is Jesus?

 What were some misconceptions about Jesus?

 What did Jesus come to do?

 What *didn't* Jesus come to do?

 How can someone become a follower of Jesus?

 What does Jesus call His followers to do?

*Mark proclaims Jesus as powerful, mysterious, and the Messiah! Has the secret of the kingdom been revealed to you (4:11-12)? What is the condition of your heart to receive His word (4:1-20)? **Keep up! The Saviour of the world blazes a trail before you!***



"GOD SAVE THE KING!":

2nd Samuel, 2nd Sovereign

Samuel is dead. The first sovereign, King Saul, proved to be a terrible king. Though David was anointed, Saul refuses to hand the throne over. But now King Saul has died. And so unfolds one of the most cherished periods in Israel's history: *Behold the reign of David the King...*



David: The Halfway Point

Matthew 1 lists the genealogy of Jesus beginning from Abraham. At the genealogy's halfway point is David. Let's recap the story so far!

- Adam & Eve:** In the Garden of Eden, God promises a seed (*an offspring*) who would destroy Satan the serpent.
- Abraham:** God promises Abraham a great piece of land, and that a great nation will come from Abraham's many descendants. God also promises a seed (*an offspring*) through whom all the nations will be blessed.
- Jacob:** Jacob blesses Judah with the promise of kingly offspring.
- Moses:** God brings the great number of Hebrews out of Egypt and makes them a nation.
- Joshua:** God makes a great nation out of Israel, and delivers to them the promised land.
- David:** David is the first king from the tribe of Judah. God's promises of land, descendants, and nationhood have been largely fulfilled. Now God unconditionally promises David an offspring whose kingdom would be established forever.

**God has not forgotten His promises!
We had better not forget too!**



What makes David so great?

At the centre of 2nd Samuel is the story of David. Why is David so important?



"a man after God's heart": In contrast to wicked King Saul, God recognised the God-fearing, God-reverencing, God-obsessive heart of David. David serves as a model to every believer.



Israel's greatest King: King Solomon may have ushered in Israel's golden era of peace and prosperity – but to the people of Israel, King David was hands-down their greatest King.



Poet King: Having filled anywhere between 73 to 122 Psalms with the most beautiful lyrics – no wonder David is called "the sweet psalmist of Israel" (2 Sam. 23:1)!



Warrior King: King David was a man of battle. He led Israel's armies to numerous victories – some of which were deemed impossible!



Human King: The greatest king was a man of humble origins. He was also a fallible, sinful man capable of great sin – yet also of great repentance.



Remembered King: King David's name is featured more than 400 times in the Old Testament *outside* of 1st & 2nd Samuel. Even in the New Testament his name is mentioned more than 50 times!

King David is also the Messianic King – one of the great shadows of the true Messiah King, Jesus Christ the son of David! What can you learn about Jesus from David's life?

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

ANNOUNCE AND ADORE:

Appointed to Acts

The book of Acts is Luke's second letter to his friend, Theophilus (the first was the gospel according to Luke). "Acts" is actually short for "The Acts of the Apostles". It focuses mainly on Peter & Paul, and on events & people who shaped the history of the early Church.

Read on for our family story...

A-xciting & A-nriching!

Who stands to benefit from reading the book of Acts? Answer:

- The Sceptic:** For the non-Christian who doesn't believe – the book of Acts provides many evidences for the Christian faith that are verifiable by sources outside the Bible! Read and ask: *"Could the Christian faith be the real deal?"*
- The Doubtful:** For the Christian who struggles with faith – the book of Acts provides encouraging & inspiring accounts of faith! Read and ask: *"Could the same faith in these believers, be in me?"*
- The Young:** For the new Christian who needs a picture of the Christian life – the book of Acts provides an example of a life of faith! Read and ask: *"Could this life of bold proclamation be mine too?"*
- The Mature:** For the long-time Christian who might be in danger of apathy & spiritual pride – the book of Acts demonstrates that God still calls you to humble action! Read and ask: *"Could I have settled for something less than a life of faith and bold witness?"*

This is a book for everyone!

God's grace pours forth from the foot of the cross, to the ends of the earth! Central to the book of Acts, is the preaching of the good news of Jesus. The Greek term for "preach the gospel" occurs more times in this book than anywhere else in the New Testament. Have you been lacking the boldness to proclaim Christ?

Keep your chin up & see the saints who have run the race before you!

"In Jerusalem, and in all Judea & Samaria, and to the End of the Earth"

The book of Acts can be viewed as an enactment of Acts 1:8!

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KEEP THE FAITH:

1 Kings, 1 Catastrophe

David's glorious reign is coming to an end. His son, Solomon, is set to become king over Israel's most prosperous and peaceful era. However, with Solomon's death comes division and deterioration.

Welcome to the beginning of the end of the Kings...



North versus South?

The nation of Israel splits into two: the Northern Kingdom of Israel & the Southern Kingdom of Judah. Don't simply pit the two kingdoms against each other! There are greater battles being waged:



'Like David' vs 'Unlike David': In 1 & 2 Kings, different rulers are often evaluated by how alike or different they are from King David. A David-like ruler was humble and obedient to God. But those unlike David did whatever they pleased. *How do you lead your life?*



True worship vs Idolatry: Both the Northern and Southern Kingdoms struggle with idolatry. In particular, the Northern Kingdom remains stuck in the "sins of Jeroboam". But in the midst of half-hearted devotion, there are a few precious instances of true worship – *don't miss them!*



Repenting at God's Word vs Rejecting God's Word: God often speaks in 1 & 2 Kings – both through His Law and prophets. However, the rulers of both Kingdoms each respond differently. Some respond with repentance and find life. Some respond with rejection and continue unto death. *Is there wisdom here for your own life?*



Is this History?

1-2 Kings is **theological history**. We are used to *modern history* – the details of the life of a nation and its rulers, the politics, the scandals, and so on. However, 1-2 Kings doesn't quite flow with our idea of a historical account. Instead, God's opinion of the nation & her kings is given greater importance over a human assessment. *This is history through God's eyes.*



Keeping company with Kings

*How can it be that David-like kings are few and far between?! Would a king as great as King David ever arise? What better place to grieve for our sins – and to rejoice at the Greater David! **Hallelujah for the Son of David!***
