

It's Yours!



Calendar

The goal is to read through the entire Bible in 3 years. This may seem like a really long process – but here's the thing: it's actually a day-by-day project. And to help and guide you – both in the daily project, and the 3-year process – we've included calendars. These calendars help you track where you are, and what you've covered. So as you move through each day, cross it off on your calendar – and praise God for the grace He's granted you that day!

Journaling Space

In addition to the calendars, there is space provided for you to jot down a response to that day's reading(s). Is there a petition you want to make? Is there something you've learnt about God? Did God speak through His word into your situation in a particular way? Or do you have a question that arose out of that text? Capture these things – and later, share them with someone else too!





TIPS ON HOW TO **READ THE BIBLE**

A good way to understand and apply the Bible, is by asking the right questions as we read through it.



What do I learn about God?

"God is the main character of the Bible, so he should be our starting point. Every passage of Scripture reveals something about God even if he's not specifically mentioned. Look for His character, His conduct, and His concerns. Also pay attention to all three persons of the Trinity."



Welcome to Genesis!

The theme of Genesis is creation, sin, judgement, and re-creation. God created the world good, but man's disobedience results in the flood. The new world after the flood is again spoiled by human sin. Is there hope?

Enter Abraham and his descendants...

- 4 The Twelve Sons




THE COVENANTS

(A covenant is an agreement between God and mankind. This word appears no less than 25 times in Genesis.)

- 1 Adamic: God's agreement with Adam as He places him in Eden
- 2 Noahic: God's agreement with Noah after the cataclysmic Flood
- 3 Abrahamic: God's multiple agreements with Abraham at different points; renewed with his sons

Genesis captures the origins of the world, human race, sin, and the Jews. It provides the foundation for <u>ALL</u> of Scripture. Read on!







Matthew tells the story of Jesus of Nazareth as the longanticipated Messiah, who brings the kingdom of God to earth and fulfils God's promise of true peace and deliverance for both Jew and Gentile.

BRIDGE


(Matthew is a book that naturally bridges the Old and New Testaments)

THE ANGELUS

In 1889 a painting by Jean-Francois Millet entitled 'The Angelus' in Paris sparked a bidding war that ended with the painting selling for 580,650 francs, an unprecedented sum of money, and in today's currency, close to 3.25 million US dollars.

The painting showed a farming couple bowing their heads in prayer as the evening church bell tolled. Apparently in the European village farms of old, the village church bell will be rung thrice daily —morning, noon, and evening—calling followers to a prayer of gratitude for the goodness of God over their lives and their village community and pray for the daily necessities of good weather, abundant crops and protection from natural calamities.

In the painting, a community, separated from each other in the week, was united by the call of the bell and by pausing to pray and reflect on the grace of God. It is not the bell or the distant physical church that united them — it is the spiritual bond of prayer, reflection and devotion.

Over the years of leading Agape into reading the Word together as a church community, I often thought of my morning time of opening the Word, reflection and prayer like what was depicted in 'The Angelus'. I imagined every time my phone registered a new whatsApp text from a church member on the reflection of the text of the day or prayer, that someone had responded to the invisible ringing of the "church bells" calling the church community to unite around the reading the Word in reflection and prayer, for that day. It always encouraged me that someone had deliberately paused to unite around the Word with the rest of the church community, now separated by distance in the week.



I believe this new devotional initiative seeks to be a bell in the distance, calling all Agapians to spiritual disciplines that foster unity and grant purpose and power. Imagine a church-full of people digging into the same Word together, while they are separated from each other. It is going to keep the church growing and glowing together, in step with one another, until they meet again in cells or on Sunday, in congregational worship.

Whether in a maze of cornfields, or a maze of cubicles, or a corner office, may we be called to the reading and study of the Scriptures and to prayer together as a church community by setting a chime, a reminder, or a notification on our mobile devices. At that tone, may we take a humble posture, similar to the humble peasant couple in "The Angelus" and may we open the Word to digest and reflect on it and pray. While we are absent from one another in the week and separated by distance, may we be a church community that is daily united in the Word and in prayer.


(Exodus carries on where Genesis left off. Some helpful questions to ask:)
