JAW-JAMMING: Judging Jesus with John

The gospel of John is markedly different from the other 3 gospels. You've got to read it and see for yourself! Jump in...

Justifying John

Here's some things to know and to look out for as you read John!

- 1. John Who? Not John "the Baptist"! John is the son of Zebedee and the brother of James. One of Jesus' 12 disciples, John is an apostle. He is also unabashedly "the disciple whom Jesus loved". *Come to love him, too!*
- 2. Triune God: John's gospel clearly depicts the trinitarian nature of God. Jesus is peculiarly depicted as "the Son", and the interplay between all 3 members of the trinity is regularly put on display. *Behold Your God!*
- **3. Signs:** John builds his gospel upon 8 "signs". These signs begin in John 2 and culminate with Jesus' resurrection from the dead in John 20. Don't miss them!
- 4. "Already but not yet": John displays the tension of the arrival of the "last days", and yet the awaiting of the fullness of hope. Pay attention to build Your house on solid rock!

John Juxtaposed

How is John's gospel any different from the previous 3?


- Omissions: John leaves out substantial material recorded in the other 3 gospels.
- Additions: John contains material not seen in the other 3.
- Supplementation: John's account contains details that help "fill the gap" from the other 3.
- Jesus: John's account agrees with the other 3 on Jesus's teaching (& style), authority as the Son of God, and His journey to the cross and beyond.



The book of Proverbs was put together by Solomon. It consists of 7 collections by Solomon and other wise individuals. 'Wisdom' is the big theme of Proverbs! *Let the wise take heed...*

G[‡] Pursuing Proverbs

Proverbs is not quite the same as most of the Bible. Here are some tips on reading it!

- 1. Understand the connection: Proverbs is unlike most of the Bible – but not *unlinked* from it! Just as the Law was given to protect sinners, Proverbs provides us with wisdom to live in a sinful world. *Proverbs is redemptive!*
- 2. Not deterministic: Proverbs is not Law! Proverbs makes use of concise, concrete comparisons (or contradictions) to provide us with titbits of wisdom. The proverbs come with beneficial or cautionary consequences – but these are not lawfully (or statistically) binding! Proverbs is meant to impress upon, not dictate!
- 3. Meet the cast: Proverbs is filled with interesting characters! The wise (embracing & living out covenant with God), the simple (remaining open, yet gullible & uncommitted), and the fool (opposed to God's covenant & a dangerous influence). Look out for other ideals (e.g. the prudent) and caricatures (e.g. the sluggard). Proverbs is meant to be immersive!
- **4. Super practical:** Proverbs is meant to be handson! Proverbs covers a wide array of topics from daily life (*e.g. friendship, work, speech, parenting, courtesy, etc.*). Proverbs helps us to see how covenant-living looks like day-today. *Proverbs offers us "skill in the art of godly living"*!

🛓 Prominent Publisher

What do we know about Solomon? He is the son of David, and the third and final king over the 12 tribes of Israel (until Jesus). King Solomon is also well known for being endowed with supernatural wisdom (1 Kings 3), and for speaking proverbs (1 Kings 4:29-34). Who better to publish the Proverbs?

APRIL



The book of Ecclesiastes reads like a philosophical work on the meaning or rather, futility, of life. The Preacher explores the many facets of life searching for meaning and gain. Let those with ears hear the words of this ancient sage...

G[€] Exposing the Eccentricities

Ecclesiastes is a tricky book to understand. Here are some key interpretive pointers!

- 1. Editor's Voice: The bookends (1:1 and 12:8-14) are written by someone else who has compiled the teachings of the Preacher. These words give us guardrails for understanding. *Remember these when you get lost!*
- 2. Confronting Fleeting, Futile Absurdities: The keyword in Ecclesiastes is futility (NASB, or "vanity" in ESV). The Preacher uses the same word in three broadly distinct ways to mean: i) something that is fleeting (cf. 11:10), ii) a futile action that does not achieve its intended result (cf. 2:11), and iii) absurd situations that are incongruous (cf. 4:7-8). *Identifying how the Preacher uses the term helps with interpreting specific passages!*
- **3. Facing Fallenness:** Ecclesiastes is about "life under the sun" (cf. 1:3, 14), i.e., life subject to the fallenness of the world. It is an honest look at the results of sin in the world which are felt by all of creation. *The Preacher's pessimism points us to yearn for the New Creation!*
- **4. Tragic Themes:** Ecclesiastes deals with the difficult questions regarding sin, injustice, and death. With heart-wrenching words, the Preacher shows us the reality of these issues in a fallen world. *The Preacher's wisdom is thoroughly aware of these tragedies!*
- **5. Enjoyment of God's gifts:** The Preacher's idea of a life lived in wisdom includes a grateful enjoyment of God's gifts. We are to receive these gifts humbly and enjoy them with reverent fear of God. *The Preacher exhorts us to enjoy God by enjoying His gifts!*







wed Fri Prayer Items

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REJECTED JEREMIAH REMINDS JUDAH: **Repent!**

The book of Jeremiah draws back the curtain on Judah's last days – leading up to the destruction of Jerusalem and the temple in 587 B.C.E. But is this fundamentally a geopolitical crisis, or a spiritual one? *Will Judah listen to God's prophet's urgent call to repent, or will they reject it and be destroyed?*

Revealing Jeremiah

1. Look out for covenantal language:

As we learnt in Deuteronomy, the old covenant established at Sinai is the basis of God's relationship with Israel. Under the covenant, obedience brings blessings and life; disobedience brings curses and death. Jeremiah tells Judah to read the events of their day against this backdrop — the crisis Judah is facing is the result of their disobedience, their rightful curse under the covenant.

- 2. Look out for God's anguish: How does God feel about punishing His people? How is it expressed in the anguish of His prophet, Jeremiah? Watch the grief that Jeremiah expresses, and let it be a sobering reminder that *God is deeply grieved by our sin.*
- 3. Look out for expressions of hope! Is God constrained by His own covenant? Is there no hope left for God's people? No! God, in His sovereignty, chooses to promise grace far above and beyond what His people deserved. His people deserved death and destruction. Yet, God determines to preserve a remnant and establish a new, everlasting covenant, where His people would sin no more. That is, in fact, the gospel.

7 Reason Judah Rejected Jeremiah?

Why was it so difficult for the people of Judah to understand and receive Jeremiah's message?

That's because they falsely believed that God had made an **irrevocable** promise to Jerusalem, its monarchy, and its temple priesthood. They assumed that they were **indispensable** to God's promise and **immune** from God's judgment!


Jeremiah challenges this ideology head-on. He points to the old covenant, points out their unfaithfulness, and asks Judah to "turn around" or "repent" — over 100 times!


In the end, false ideology could not save them. Judah was destroyed – not ultimately by foreign powers – but by the sovereign LORD who purposed it so.




















REDISCOVERING THE RESOLUTION: Redeeming Revelation

The Revelation (no "s") of John might be the most misunderstood biblical book. While many mine its pages for predictions of how the world ends, John's concerns are more complex. *Read on for encouragement on living amidst persecution...*

😹 Restoring Reason

Revelation is full of rabbit holes. We respond to two common questions to help you reap its truth.

- 1. Is this a letter, prophecy, or apocalypse? The answer is. all three! Revelation is:
 - A letter to seven churches (1:1-7). Their surrounding culture is significant in interpretation (e.g., understanding what it means to be "lukewarm" cf. 3:16)
 - b. A prophecy (1:3; 22:7, 18-19). John receives a word from God that interprets contemporary events, just like OT prophets (10:8-11, cf. Ezekiel 2:8-3:3). He writes not from his own perspective (unlike a standard epistle), but from God's revelation.
 - c. An apocalypse (1:1). John receives visions full of OT imagery through otherworldly means (e.g., 4:1). The heavenly reality uncovers and interprets the earthly reality.
- 2. How am I to make sense of the events and symbols in the book? Traditionally, there are four main ways to interpret Revelation. Each view has strengths and weaknesses, yet the historicist view bears no relevance to John's intended readers and should be discredited. Hence, the wise approach combines the strengths of the latter three views without being bound to one.

View	Events symbolise	Example
Historicist	World history	Antichrist = Hitler
Preterist	Events in John's time	Judgment = fall of Jerusalem
Futurist	End of history	Tribulation, Rapture
Idealist	Timeless spiritual truths	God is sovereign

💘 Refocusing the Report


The question throughout Revelation is, "Who rules the world?" The answer is that despite contrarian appearances, the Triune God has sovereign control over the fate of His creation. Hence, John exhorts his readers to conquer not by force, but by emulating the Lamb in enduring suffering, and thereby worship God. *Are you* prepared to suffer for our great God?


