# Sermon Notes from 14 July

## A Deliverance to Remember (Exodus 11:1 - 13:16)

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In this passage, we see how God uses the 10th plague to bring about the deliverance of His people. The deliverance is not just a factual recount of Israel's national history, but also serves a spiritual purpose - it teaches us that God has delivered His people from humanity's greatest trouble.

#### <u>3 things about this deliverance from</u> <u>God that must be remembered:</u>

#### 1) Remember His Judgement

Ex. 11:4-5 - People tend to remember God as Deliverer without remembering Him as Judge. We need to see God's deliverance and judgement as inter-related.

The term 'firstborn' had special significance in the ancient near-east; they had special rights and authority. God's judgement to kill the firstborn from all sectors (human and cattle) of Egyptian society was an extremely serious one. We also see a heightened sense of God's personal involvement in this plague; He would be the immediate performer of it. God is the one actively bringing about judgement (Ex. 12:12). He is the God of justice. He looked upon the Israelites suffering, just as a father would look upon his son's suffering. God saw His people as His son (Ex. 4:22-23). He waited patiently for hundreds of years for repentance, but nothing changed.

Ex. 12:12 – God was not just judging the people in Egypt for their sins; but as the Ultimate Authority, judging the false gods of Egypt that were enslaving everyone with falsehood. Each plague was targeted at exposing false gods. Fake-news enslaves, but the truth of the good news saves. Don't fall for the scams of fake gods!

#### 2) Remember His Love

God's deliverance of His people shows His love for them. He blesses them with material possessions (Ex. 11:2-3) and the promise of no harm upon them (Ex. 11:7). While God regarded the sons of Israel and Egypt very differently, they both were in need of God's saving grace. It is this grace, His own covenantal goodness (Ex. 2:24) and His promise of blessings (Ex. 12:2) that spared them from His judgement. God was saving not just the ethnic Jews but all who saw and believed God by grace through faith (Ex. 12:38). Our only hope for deliverance is the same covenantal love God had over His people at Egypt. God teaches us through the physical exodus that sinful humanity needs a spiritual exodus; a deliverance from sin and death. God deems His people as firstborn not by nature, but through adoption (Ro. 9:4). This distinct love is given not based on performance, but by grace.

### 3) Remember His Passover

God introduces 3 important interrelated rites (the Passover, the Festival of Unleavened Bread and the Consecration of the Firstborn). The Passover, in particular, is especially important and deserves emphasis.

#### What can we learn from the Passover?

#1 It marks a new beginning for God's people (Ex. 12:1-2) – God has delivered us from sin and slavery and now we have a new life!

#2 It is so important that it needs to be taught in re-enactment for future generations (Ex. 12:24-27) – Remember the Passover for our good and His glory! #3 The blood of a substitute is needed for the Passover (Ex. 12:3-7) – Salvation is accomplished by faith in the substitute.

Only the blood of the perfect Lamb of God can save (Joh. 1:29). The Passover in Egypt ultimately points to Jesus Christ – God's unblemished sacrificial Lamb of God (1 Co. 5:7). Jesus instituted the Lord's supper to be re-enacted for remembrance of the Passover (Lu. 22:19). Look up and remember the deliverance! We overcome on the ground of the blood of the Lamb (Re. 5:12)!
